Temporomandibular dysfunction (TMD) is a frequently occurring malady in dentistry. It can be divided into two types – muscular and bony. About 80% of the patients with TMD have only muscular involvement, and 80% of TMD patients are women, as shown by many studies. Treatment for muscular TMD is relatively simple and is the subject of this video. Treatment of bony TMD is more complicated and only infrequently completely overcome. Practitioners are encouraged to treat muscular TMD whenever encountered to avoid joint degeneration into bony TMD.
